The Trustee Board presents its report together with the financial statements of the company for the year ended 31st March 2016

#### Introduction from the Chair, Robert Fryer

I am pleased to introduce our annual report in this, our 50th anniversary year. We have a great legacy of service to our local community which informs our continuing and developing work.

Our new Director, Krzysztof ("Chris") Mikata-Pralat, started with us in March 2016. We have two new trustees this year who bring additional experience and knowledge to the board.

The number of beneficiaries for whom we have offered help has increased substantially over the year, as has the number of our volunteers. The total number of 'jobs' completed in the period has increased by nearly 40%. We have plans in place to increase further our reach into the community.

I would like to thank all who contribute to our work. We are well set for the challenges ahead - hopefully for another 50 years.

#### The Charity's Aims

Our aims are to provide practical assistance to the people of Fulham in their own homes or elsewhere necessitated by age, illness, infirmity, disability or other need. Reference to Fulham means the area of the former Metropolitan Borough of Fulham as constituted on 31 March 1965 and its surrounding areas.

We provide services which any good neighbour would:

• odd jobs

• escort to appointments

- gardeningDIY
- medicine collection
- accompany shopping
- take care of pets
- emergency shopping
- letter posting
- reading
  - befriending

Our free services are delivered by local volunteers, many of whom are older people. We also run a dedicated befriending scheme and a range of social clubs to help beat isolation and loneliness. We provide these services on a regular or ad hoc basis.

#### **Review of Developments, Activities and Achievements**

These activities are largely possible thanks to the grant received from the London Borough of Hammersmith and Fulham via the 3rd Sector Investment Fund.

#### Practical Help and Befriending

Our volunteers undertook nearly 500 practical tasks in our clients' own homes. We continued to take part in a befriending project called 'Beating Isolation', funded by The Big Lottery Fund, in conjunction with two other local charities: Bishop Creighton House and Hammersmith and Fulham Mind.

#### Social Clubs

Our monthly Silver Club continued to grow thanks to the hospitality and generosity of the Hollywood Arms staff and members of the Fulham and Chelsea Women's Institute.


We offer a weekly Reachout Social Club on Wednesday afternoons at Rosaline Hall and trialled two Travelling Reachouts at sheltered housing schemes in December 2015.

#### Gardening and Decorating

Our gardening and decorating project continues to be one of our services in highest demand. In addition to our practical work mentioned above, we undertook gardening and decorating projects for over 100 local older and/or disabled clients. Thanks to the support of The Daisy Trust we were able to acquire a cargo bike to travel to assignments with our equipment. We have received considerable practical support from corporate volunteers at Assael Architecture for which we are very grateful.

#### Achievements, recent developments and plans for future activities

A beneficiaries' survey conducted with over 30 clients in December 2015 gave the following results:

Thanks to the generous legacy of Nina Dobosharevich, a veteran of the 2nd World War, a local resident and a long-term client, the charity is in a strong position to deliver increasing services to the community in future years. The trustees have started a conversation on the best use of this legacy.

We plan to offer space at Rosaline Hall at a subsidised rate to local groups working with older people. The charity invested in promotional materials during the period:

- a video, which is accessible on our website www.fulhamgoodneighbours.org
- bookmarks and information leaflet
- banners to attract new clients and volunteers

In March 2016 we started a monthly e-newsletter, which we hope will enable us to keep in touch with our clients, volunteers and supporters.

We see our work as part of a bigger effort to address needs in the community and therefore became members of both Age Action Alliance and the Small Charities Coalition.

## **Constitution and Organisation**

The charity is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association which provide for:

- With his or her consent, the Mayor of the London Borough of Hammersmith and Fulham to be president of the society - The election of a Trustee Board including an Honorary Secretary, an Honorary Treasurer and an Assistant Honorary Treasurer and up to seven other members.

For the purposes of charity law, the Trustee Board is the executive trustee body of the charity. The "Trustees" and President perform non-executive roles and are regarded as custodian trustees.

#### Investments

There are no specific restrictions placed on the trustees' powers of investment by the constitution.

#### **Statement on Public Benefit**

The Trustees have paid due regard to the guidance on public benefit produced by The Charity Commission and are confident that the work of the charity meets all the criteria for public benefit.

#### Risk

The Trustees believe that risks to the organisation and its property are adequately covered by its insurance and reserves. Our reserves are a mix of designated funds and free reserves. Those funds designated for a specific purpose are retained as such until that purpose is fulfilled.

#### **Reserves Policies**

Our policy is that free reserves should provide the charity with adequate financial stability and the means for it to meet its charitable objectives for the foreseeable future.

The trustees intend, as a minimum, to maintain the charity's free reserves at a level which is at least equivalent to three years' net operational expenditure, taking into account realistic funding streams.

The trustees review the amount of free reserves that are required to ensure that they are adequate to fulfil the charity's continuing obligations on a bi-monthly basis.

## STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

### Accounts

The Trustee Board is required under the terms of certain grants received by the charity to produce financial statements each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of its financial activities for the that year. In preparing those financial statements, the Trustee Board is required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;

- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;

- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the charity will continue in business.

The Trustee Board is responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose, with reasonable accuracy, at any time the financial position of the charity. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud or other irregularities.

So far as the Trustee Board are aware, there is no relevant information of which the charity's Independent Examiner is unaware and they have taken all of the steps necessary that they ought to have taken as Trustees in order to make themselves aware of any relevant information and to establish that the Independent Examiner is aware of that information. The financial statements were prepared in accordance with the small company regime (Section 419(2) of the Companies Act 2006).

I report on the accounts for the year ended 31 March 2016 set out on pages five to fourteen.

#### Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees (who are also the directors for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The charity's trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year (under Section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act)) and that an independent examination is required. The charity's gross income exceeded £250,000 and I am qualified to undertake the examination by being a qualified member of Institute of Chartered Accountants in England and Wales.

Having satisfied myself that the charity is not subject to audit under company law and is eligible for independent examination, it is my responsibility to:

- examine the accounts under Section 145 of the 2011 Act
- to follow the procedures laid down in the General Directions given by the Charity Commission (under Section 145(5)(b) of the 2011 Act); and
- to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

#### Basis of the independent examiner's report

My examination was carried out in accordance with the General Directions given by the Charity Commission. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeking explanations from you as trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently no opinion is given as to whether the accounts present a 'true and fair view ' and the report is limited to those matters set out in the statements below.

## NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

## 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of investments which are included at market value, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

#### Prior year adjustment

Some of the items included under Incoming Resources have been reclassified in the 2015 accounts from Voluntary Income to Other Incoming Resources. This has no effect on the total Incoming Resources, which amount remains unchanged.

#### Exemption from preparing a cash flow statement

Exemption has been taken from preparing a cash flow statement on the grounds that the charitable company qualifies as a small charitable company.

#### Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Cash donations, gifts, legacies and collections are treated as income in the year in which they are received. Income from special events is included in the income and expenditure account in the year the event takes place.

Income from investments and covenanted income including, where appropriate, imputed tax credits are accounted for on a receivable basis.

Voluntary help is not included in the financial statements.

#### **Resources expended**

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

#### Fixed assets for charity use

Fixed assets, other than office premises, are stated at cost less provision for depreciation at 25% per annum on cost.

Freehold property, which represents the Charity's office premises, is stated at cost in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice. The freehold property is not depreciated. Instead, the cost of repairs is charged to the Income and Expenditure Account in the year in which it is incurred.

#### Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

## 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

# Fund accounting

# **Restricted funds**

Where a donor has specified a particular purpose for a grant or donation, the income is shown as restricted income in the Statement of Financial Activities. Any such income unexpended at the year end is shown as a restricted fund in the balance sheet. Where grants are received to fund capital expenditure the assets acquired, after any depreciation, are shown as an expendable endowment fund.

#### **Designated funds**

Where funds held for general purposes are allocated by the trustees for specific future uses they are transferred to a designated fund. Expenditure for the purposes specified is deducted from those funds and the unexpended balance is shown as part of unrestricted funds in the balance sheet. If the trustees decide that such funds are no longer needed for the purposes specified the balance of the fund is transferred to general unrestricted funds.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
